### DESCRIPTION

The **devinfo** library provides access to the kernel's internal device hierarchy and to the I/O resource manager. The library uses a sysctl(3) interface to obtain a snapshot of the kernel's state, which is then made available to the application.

Due to the fact that the information may be logically arranged in a number of different fashions, the library does not attempt to impose any structure on the data.

Device, resource, and resource manager information is returned in data structures defined in *<devinfo.h>*:

The *devinfo\_handle\_t* values can be used to look up the correspondingly referenced structures.

**devinfo\_init**() takes a snapshot of the kernel's internal device and resource state. It returns nonzero if after a number of retries a consistent snapshot cannot be obtained. **devinfo\_init**() must be called before any other functions can be used.

**devinfo\_free**() releases the memory associated with the snapshot. Any pointers returned by other functions are invalidated by this, and **devinfo\_init**() must be called again before using any other functions.

**devinfo\_handle\_to\_device**(), **devinfo\_handle\_to\_resource**() and **devinfo\_handle\_to\_rman**() return pointers to *devinfo\_dev*, *devinfo\_res* and *devinfo\_rman* structures respectively based on the *devinfo\_handle\_t* passed to them. These functions can be used to traverse the tree from any node to any other node. If **devinfo\_handle\_to\_device**() is passed the constant DEVINFO\_ROOT\_DEVICE it will return the handle to the root of the device tree.

**devinfo\_foreach\_device\_child**() invokes its callback argument fn on every device which is an immediate child of *device*. The fn function is also passed arg, allowing state to be passed to the callback function. If fn returns a nonzero error value the traversal is halted, and **devinfo\_foreach\_device\_child**() returns the error value to its caller.

**devinfo\_foreach\_device\_resource**() invokes its callback argument *fn* on every resource which is owned by *device*. The *fn* function is also passed *device* and *arg*, allowing state to be passed to the callback function. If *fn* returns a nonzero error value the traversal is halted, and **devinfo\_foreach\_device\_resource**() returns the error value to its caller.

**devinfo\_foreach\_rman\_resource**() invokes its callback argument *fn* on every resource within the resource manager *rman*. The *fn* function is also passed *arg*, allowing state to be passed to the callback function. If *fn* returns a nonzero error value the traversal is halted, and **devinfo\_foreach\_rman\_resource**() returns the error value to its caller.

**devinfo\_foreach\_rman**() invokes its callback argument fn on every resource manager. The fn function is also passed arg, allowing state to be passed to the callback function. If fn returns a nonzero error value the traversal is halted, and **devinfo\_foreach\_rman**() returns the error value to its caller.

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# **BUGS**

This is the first implementation of the library, and the interface is still subject to refinement.

The interface does not report device classes or drivers, making it hard to sort by class or driver.
